Six of CNDC’s member CDCs are partners in the Steps to a Healthier Cleveland program being coordinated locally by the Cleveland Department of Health: Bellaire-Puritas Development Corporation, Clark-Metro Development Corporation, Detroit Shoreway Community Development Organization, Northeastern Neighborhood Development Corporation, Ohio City Near West Development Corporation, and Slavic Village Development. CNDC is serving as the fiscal agent for the CDCs.

Steps to a Healthier Cleveland is a city-wide program designed to engage all Clevelanders to live longer, better and healthier lives. The program is part of a larger Steps to a HealthierUS funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. The Steps to a Healthier Cleveland program encourages physical activity, healthy eating and tobacco-free choices. These efforts are intended to reduce the burden of diabetes, overweight/obesity and asthma in Cleveland’s neighborhoods.

The CDCs participating in the program will have their community organizers involved in six key areas:

- Participating in development of neighborhood intervention maps
- Assisting with implementation of a Safe Routes to School initiative at the intervention school identified in their neighborhood
- Identifying 3-5 businesses to engage in worksite wellness initiatives
- Recruiting residents and helping to identify locations for community gardens
- Helping create and identify messages for the program’s communications plan
- Organizing 2 meetings to identify and recruit Community Health Workers

Public Policy Notes

An Update on Rebuild Ohio's Advocacy Committee. Rebuild Ohio's Advocacy Committee had its kick-off phone conference in early March with 16 participants calling in from several parts of the state, and representing a variety of government, nonprofit and business entities. Enterprise Community Partners generously hosted the call. Mary Helen Petrus of CNDC and Gene Krebs of Greater Ohio are serving as co-chairs of this committee.

Participants on the call discussed the initial proposed work plan for 2006. Projects include: identifying current legislative activities that relate to vacant and abandoned properties and ways to complement them; identifying potential legislative allies; identifying a strategy to develop a statewide reform agenda and to identify priority issues; developing a plan of outreach to decision makers, organizations with interests in redevelopment issues, and gubernatorial candidates; developing a statewide media strategy with localized connections, in particular to insert the issues of Rebuild Ohio into local and state elections held this year. This work plan will evolve as Rebuild Ohio's other committees begin projects of their own.

Rebuild Ohio's vision is to promote reclamation and redevelopment of vacant and abandoned property for enhanced quality of life in neighborhoods, towns and cities throughout the state. Rebuild Ohio is a consortium of local government, nonprofit and civic organizations concerned with the debilitating effects of vacant and abandoned property in Ohio. To reduce the number of problem properties in the state, Rebuild Ohio works to prevent the cycle of abandonment and to remove the barriers to the redevelopment of residential, commercial and industrial land. Through research, education and advocacy, Rebuild Ohio seeks to improve existing code enforcement, land use, data information and other preventative tools and to develop new state and local policies for expeditious acquisition and disposition of properties.

In 2006, Rebuild Ohio hopes to conduct two major studies – one a needs assessment to survey existing laws and tools that address problem properties in the state and to recommend specific reforms, the other a

study to document the cost implications of vacant and abandoned property. In addition, Rebuild Ohio will engage in activities to raise awareness of the issue and to reach out to all interested parties.

In addition to the Advocacy Committee, Rebuild Ohio has committees on Communications, Education, Research, Funding, and Ohio Vacant Properties Forum II. Columbus Mayor Launches HOME AGAIN program. The initiative, announced in Mayor Coleman's State of the City address in late February, will dedicate \$25 million in capital funding over six years to revitalize 1,000 blighted properties. The funding will be used for prevention, aggressive code enforcement, acquisition of properties, rehabilitation and demolition. The city will conduct the program in partnership with City Attorney Rick Pfeiffer, Columbus City Council, neighborhood groups, the Columbus/Franklin County Affordable Housing Trust Corporation, the Ohio Housing Finance Agency/ Authority, and The Ohio Capital Corporation for Housing.

been referred to the House Committee on Financial Institutions, Real Estate and Securities, and hearings on the bill began mid-March. Rep. Christopher Widener, chair of the committee, was to offer a new provision that would add a financial education plan for K-12 school curriculums. Another bill of note was recently introduced by Senator Ray Miller. S.B. 286 would prohibit check-cashing businesses from making loans to a customer who has an outstanding loan with another licensee, create a statewide database of open loans at check-cashing licensees, and change the permitted interest rate, fees, and duration of such loans. Job Growth Report Released by The Center for Community Solutions

The Center for Community Solutions has released a new report that covers Ohio's job growth relative to the job growth that has been generated in the rest of the United States for the last several decades. Very unfortunately, Ohio has once again broken the all-time record by going 117 consecutive months with its job growth below the USA national average. This is by far the longest streak of sub-par job growth in the history of Ohio. The state has gone nearly nine consecutive years with its job growth below the USA national average, with all months of all those years included.

The streak started in March 1996, and it has continued for all 117 consecutive months since then. That has never happened previously in Ohio, but it remains a situation that is among the most severe problems that the state of Ohio faces. During recessions, Ohio lost jobs more rapidly than the rest of the country lost jobs. During recoveries, Ohio's job growth was continuously slower than simultaneous job growth in the rest of the United States. That pattern remains intact in the latest figures on employment.

The Grow Cuyahoga County Fund

On Thursday, March 2, 2006, the Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) launched The **Grow Cuyahoga County Fund**, a regional economic development fund operated in conjunction with the National Development Council, one of the nation's oldest non-profit organizations for community and economic development. Currently the fund has received funding from the BOCC and the Cuyahoga County Community Improvement Corporation (CCCIC). Every local dollar is expected to leverage four additional dollars through the National Development Council's Community Development Bank.

The Grow Cuyahoga County Fund can make loans ranging from \$35,000 to \$1 million. The loans will generally be at rates of prime to prime plus 2%, for terms up to 25 years depending on the proposed use of funds. Loan proceeds may be used for any legitimate business purpose, including working capital, machinery and equipment, acquisition of land and building, construction, renovations and tenant improvements. The Grow Cuyahoga County Fund does not provide venture capital and cannot provide funds for research and development or to satisfy equity or near-equity needs. The program provides economic development incentives that are not currently available in the community including working capital financing and the financing for retail and restaurants.
