“Celebrating Neighborhoods: The 2005 Community Development Awards” event will be held this year on Thursday, June 9, 2005 from 5:30 –8:30 p.m. at The Cleveland Botanical Garden. The event is sponsored by Cleveland Neighborhood Development Coalition, The Enterprise Foundation, Local Initiatives Support Corporation, Neighborhood Housing Services, and Neighborhood Progress, Inc.

The event was established in 2001 to recognize the people, projects and organizations that have made Cleveland a national model in the community development field. Winners will be selected by a panel of representatives of the sponsoring organizations sometime later in the month.

SECOND CDC-DEVELOPER CONNECTIONS EVENT A SUCCESS

Over eighty real estate professionals and CDC staff met on February 24 to discuss proposed projects in seven participating neighborhoods during the second CDC-Developers Connection event. The event was created in 2003 to facilitate dialogue between CDCs and local developers to encourage more interest in neighborhood projects. Judging from overheard conversations, the program met its goal.

The CDCs selected for the event were Cudell Improvement, Inc., Detroit Shoreway, Fairfax Renaissance, Little Italy, Old Brooklyn, and St. Clair Superior. Groups worked for several weeks with coaches from the development community to refine the details of the proposed development. In turn, the coaches learned about the CDC’s service area in order to advocate on the CDC’s behalf.

After a short introduction to the Social Compact Drill-down Study by Stephanie Turner of KeyBank, CDCs informally presented their projects. Invited guests circulated throughout the first floor of the Sarah Benedict House to view each neighborhood’s display and ask questions. In addition to a large information board created by the Kent State Urban Design Center, CDCs developed handouts with more detailed information.

CDC-Developer Connection was generously underwritten by the National Association of Industrial and Office Properties, and represented a partnership between the Greater Cleveland Real Estate Organization and CNDC.

Public Policy Notes

President's FY 2006 Budget eliminates the CDBG program. In early February, the Bush Administration released its proposed fiscal year 2006 budget. The budget would eliminate funding for 18 federal community development programs, including Community Development Block Grants. Programs currently funded by seven federal agencies at a total of \$5.7 billion would be consolidated into a single Strengthening America's Community Initiative at a \$3.7 billion level. This initiative would be administered by the Department of Commerce as an economic development block grant program and would focus on serving very low-income communities and job loss issues. According to The Enterprise Foundation, this consolidation represents a 35 percent cut in federal funding for community development.

The President's budget also proposes to consolidate and or eliminate other programs funded through HUD and otherwise, including the Section 4 capacity building program, brownfield redevelopment, Empowerment Zone grants, Community Development Loan guarantees, HOPE VI, CDFI fund's grants and Bank Enterprise Award programs, and the Economic Development Administration.

CNDC's website, www.cndc2.org/policy.htm, will feature future policy alerts throughout the federal budget process.

A civil receivership program is being developed by Cleveland's Department of Law, in conjunction with the Departments of Building and Housing and Community Development. Civil receivership is a code enforcement tool that can be used to reclaim abandoned and vacant properties, but potential legal and preliminary planning costs are prohibitive and deter many CDCs from pursuing this course of action. It comes as very good news, therefore, that the City will file receivership cases through this Law Department program, which will defray legal costs to CDCs. The Law Department is currently seeking properties to analyze for suitability for receivership. Contact Michele R. Comer, Assistant Director of

Recent publications. "The Crisis in America's Housing: Confronting Myths and Promoting a Balanced Housing Policy," debunks three myths about housing in America: subsidized housing is unnecessary - left on its own, the market will provide safe, decent and affordable housing for everyone; today federal government housing subsidies go disproportionately and "unwisely" to "undeserving" low-income renters in urban areas; homeownership is the best housing option for everyone, all the time, everywhere. According to the report, these myths pervade housing policy and support focusing on homeownership as "the answer to the nation's housing needs." The report shows that many homeowners are unable to financially handle mortgages and maintenance, are therefore at risk of foreclosure. The report, produced by the Center for Community Change, the Center for Economic and Policy Research, the Children's Defense Fund, the Community Learning Project and the National Low Income Housing Coalition, can be downloaded at <http://www.nlihc.org/research/housingmyths.pdf>.

The National Housing Trust Fund Campaign recently released its policy proposal for 2005. See <http://www.nhtf.org> to download a copy of this document. The campaign seeks to establish a National Housing Trust fund to serve as a source of revenue for the production of new housing, and the preservation or rehabilitation of existing housing that is affordable for low-income people, with the goal of 1,500,000 units of housing over the next ten years.

Government Properties for Sale can be found at HomeSales.gov, a site that HUD, the Department of Veterans Affairs and the U.S. Department of Agriculture developed. HomeSales.gov is the first joint government online listing of homes for sale by the government. The public can search by location and by house characteristics such as number of bedrooms and bathrooms. The website has links to the relevant agencies for instructions on how to bid on the properties.

COMMITTEE CORNER

Community Organizers' Committee: Councilman Jay Westbrook shared his thoughts regarding the importance of community organizing, particularly city-wide. Mikelann Rensel and Kara Lubischer offered suggestions on potential funding sources for community organizing. Rachel gave an update on the COIP process, which has basically been eliminated for the future. Much discussion ensued regarding the direction that NPI is headed as it relates to future community organizing funding. Joe Mueller suggested that a subcommittee be formed to look at funding for city-wide organizing. Kara Lubischer, Roberto Leon and Mary Landers volunteered for the subcommittee.

Housing Committee: At its January meeting, the Housing Committee heard a presentation by Frank Ford of Neighborhood Progress Inc. on recent efforts and initiatives concerning vacant properties. These efforts involve reclaiming properties for sustainable reuse. The committee also discussed prevention measures to address foreclosures and predatory lending. The subcommittee 2005 meeting schedule is as follows; the Code Enforcement subcommittee will meet the first Wednesday of every month; the Housing Programs and Services Subcommittee will meet the second Wednesday of every month; and the Development subcommittee will meet the third Wednesday of every month. Subcommittees will meet at noon at CNDC unless otherwise notified.

Retail Commercial Support Initiative: The February meeting was an informal discussion of a variety of topics affecting retail development in the city. The COSE Business Plan Challenge was announced. The March meeting will feature Bob Brown, director of the Cleveland Planning Commission.

Safety Committee Report: The agenda for the February meeting included an update on the progress of the development of safety kit for local merchants, and a presentation by Elizabeth Newman of the City about the status of CitiStat. She also shared some sample maps to show the groups the system's mapping capability. A report by staff responsible for best practices research was next. The scheduled peer-to-peer training on data base management was postponed until the March meeting.
