

Cleveland to Stage Third Annual Ingenuity Festival

Cleveland's third annual *Ingenuity: Cleveland Festival of Art and Technology* is scheduled for Thursday through Sunday, July 19-22, 2007, at the Playhouse Square District in downtown Cleveland. Organizers are expecting more than 80,000 visitors to witness this year's extravaganza – rain or shine.

The Festival is a four-day celebration of art, music, dance, theater and technology – including cutting-edge art-and-technology collaborations and integrations. There will be indoor and outdoor events including a family village. All outdoor events are free.

World-class artists from across the United States as well as Canada and Europe will present original works along with the finest of Northeast Ohio's performing and visual artists. In all, there will be participation from more than 1,000 individuals and more than 90 organizations including Karamu House, the Museum of Contemporary Art and NASA.

There will be musical performances featuring everything from jazz and hip-hop, to classical and techno. Stage acts will also present opera and ballet as well as theater and contemporary dance – even audio ballet. Visitors can enjoy galleries and exhibits plus street performers such as jugglers, poets and more!

Public Policy Notes

Federal legislative update.

- Senator Charles E. Schumer (D-NY), with Senators Sherrod Brown (D-Ohio) and Robert P. Casey Jr. (D-PA), recently introduced S. 1299, the Borrower's Protection Act of 2007, a bill that would establish a fiduciary duty and other standards of care for mortgage brokers and originators, and to establish standards to assess a consumer's ability to repay. This bill is of the first federal legislative attempts to address rising foreclosure rates throughout the U.S.
- The House Financial Services Committee approved H.B. 1852, a bill that overhauls the mortgage lending practices of the Federal Housing Administration. The bill would increase loan limits for FHA-backed loans, raise loan limits in high-cost real estate markets, and allow FHA to vary premiums charged to borrowers with different risk profiles. The committee approved a compromise proposal regarding the creation of an affordable housing trust fund. First use of surplus FHA funds will be used to ensure the solvency of the single-family mortgage program and another \$58 million to counseling. Left over funds would go to the affordable housing trust fund.

State legislation of interest.

- H.B 138, a bill introduced by Representatives Foley and Blessing, was heard in committee in May. The House Civil and Commercial Law Committee heard sponsor testimony May 9, and proponent testimony May 16, 23 and 30. H.B. 138 would require purchasers of real property at a judicial sale to provide identifying information, allow cities to conduct inspections of property subject to write of execution, require judicial sales to be confirmed within thirty days of sale, and require officers who sell real property at a judicial sale to file a deed within fourteen days of confirmation.

Recent reports and studies.

A recent Brookings Institution report, "Borrowing to Get Ahead, and Behind: The Credit Boom and Bust in Lower-Income Markets," examines lending variations across different low-income markets. Findings include: over 55 percent of lower-income households held debt in 2004, an increase of 10 percent since 1989; use of credit in lower-income markets varies widely from place to place across the country, as does management of credit and potential growth in the supply of credit. The report uses Federal Reserve data and a database of over 14 million anonymous credit reports from TransUnion, and can be found at www.brookings.edu.

Going Comprehensive: Anatomy of an Initiative that Worked, CCRP in the South Bronx, a LISC publication by Anita Miller and Tom Burns, describes lessons learned from the Comprehensive Community Revitalization Program, an experiment in community building with and through CDCs. The book can be downloaded from www.lisc.org.

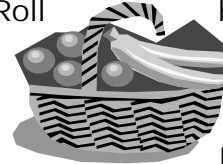
