

Chief of Police Mike McGrath Announces Community Services Units

Federal funding for the successful Fresh Start program has ended. Information from the Cleveland Police Department indicates that thousands of drug dealers were arrested; large amounts of cash, weapons, and drugs were taken from neighborhood streets and calls for drug dealers disturbing residents dropped from a peak of 15,647 in 2002 to 11,319 in 2005.

On March 1, 2006 Chief Mike McGrath ordered the elimination of the six neighborhood Fresh Start units and replaced them with a new unit model to be known as the Community Services Unit (CSU). The mission of the CSU remains the same as its predecessor, Fresh Start: excellent service to the community and improving the quality of life for those who live, work, and visit the City of Cleveland. The number of personnel assigned has not changed, but new ideas such as zones of operations, more flexible work hours, expanded duties and more community interaction should make

CSU more responsive to the needs and expectations of the neighborhoods. Please refer to the accompanying chart for CSU direct contact information.

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Public Policy Notes

An Update on Rebuild Ohio. As of late April, Rebuild Ohio's Advocacy, Research, Funding and Education Committees had conducted initial phone conferences. The Advocacy Committee decided on its initial work plan for 2006, which includes: identifying current legislative activities that relate to vacant and abandoned properties and ways to complement them; identifying potential legislative allies; identifying a strategy to develop a statewide reform agenda and to identify priority issues; developing a plan of outreach to decision makers, organizations with interests in redevelopment issues, and gubernatorial candidates; developing a statewide media strategy with localized connections, in particular to insert the issues of Rebuild Ohio into local and state elections held this year.

The Research Committee's identified tasks are to support a study of the costs vacant and abandoned properties impose on neighborhood residents and state and local governments. These tasks include: identifying data collection methodologies and inventory models; connecting data collection and inventory techniques to the study's purpose; and finding research and data collection partners. The Funding Committee will primarily try to find resources for Rebuild Ohio's research activities. The Education Committee will develop a tool box of best practices, as well as a strategy to disseminate information about best practices and issues involving abandoned properties in Ohio.

Rebuild Ohio's vision is to promote reclamation and redevelopment of vacant and abandoned property for enhanced quality of life in neighborhoods, towns and cities throughout the state. Rebuild Ohio is a consortium of local government, nonprofit and civic organizations concerned with the debilitating effects of vacant and abandoned property in Ohio. To reduce the number of problem properties in the state, Rebuild Ohio works to prevent the cycle of abandonment and to remove the barriers to the redevelopment of residential, commercial and industrial land. Through research, education and advocacy, Rebuild Ohio seeks to improve existing code enforcement, land use, data information and other

preventative tools and to develop new state and local policies for expeditious acquisition and disposition of properties.

In 2006, Rebuild Ohio hopes to conduct two major studies – one a needs assessment to survey existing laws and tools that address problem properties in the state and to recommend specific reforms, the other a study to document the costs implications of vacant and abandoned property. In addition, Rebuild Ohio will engage in activities to raise awareness of the issue and to reach out to all interested parties.

Predatory lending legislation update. Sub. S.B. 185 (the Ohio Homeowners' Protection Act) as passed by the Ohio House in late March has received strong criticism from consumer advocates, including the Coalition on Homelessness and Housing in Ohio, for containing many problematic provisions. The Senate did not concur with the provisions added by the House, and a joint conference committee will meet in May to settle differences. In the meantime, a recent Policy Matters study reported that Ohio's home foreclosure rate increased 8.5% in 2005 from 2004, with many sheriffs' departments pointing to an increase in predatory lending as the primary cause. Coalition for Ohio's Future report documents adverse effects of TEL Amendment on Ohio Schools. The new study by The Center for Community Solutions found that if the proposed Tax Expenditure Limit (TEL) amendment were passed, schools would have great difficulty passing local issues, would see reductions in state aid, and would have no way to
