

## CNDC and Hard Hatted Women Collaboration a Success!

Last spring, Debbi Perkul, Education Director from Hard Hatted Women, attended a meeting of the CNDC's Commercial Retail Support Initiative and proposed a collaboration between the two organizations through Hard Hatted Women's Pre-Apprenticeship Training Program. As part of the training program, the women work with a non-profit organization to do a hands-on building or renovation project to gain real-life experience in the trades. Most of the students in this program are women from the City of Cleveland who take this class as a first step towards empowering themselves to become economically independent and better able to take care of themselves and their families.

Debbi suggested that since the CDCs are closest to the residents of the communities, they could serve as effective recruitment outlets for the PAT program. In return, HHW would do hands-on projects with the CDCs to help fix up the neighborhoods.

The response has been overwhelmingly positive. Many CDCs have offered to put information about

HHW education programs, including brand new programs in high-tech fields, into their newsletters. Fairfax Renaissance Dev. Corp. included a flyer about the Fall 2005 PAT class in their summer newsletter which generated about 200 phone calls to HHW asking for more information.

Matt Wiederhold from Detroit Shoreway suggested a hands-on project for the PAT students in his neighborhood. On October 8<sup>th</sup>, HHW students trekked over to West 65<sup>th</sup> and Detroit to begin the big job of renovating the Kennedy Building. The women worked on patching walls and tearing up old flooring. They also will be building a bathroom for the building.

Matt remarked, "I am excited about the partnership between CNDC and HHW because it illustrates a non-traditional partnership between two diverse non-profit organizations working to improve quality of life in Cleveland's neighborhoods. I'm particularly proud that Detroit Shoreway was one of the first community development organizations to benefit through this partnership. We have limited funds for commercial space improvements, and even more limited staff. By working with HHW, we are going to be able to get a valuable piece of real estate back on the market, and hopefully house some much needed goods and services on the Near West Side."

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# Public Policy Notes

**State Senator Joy Padgett introduces bill to amend the Consumer Sales Practices Act to include mortgage lenders.** S.B. 185 would modify the CSPA to remove the current exemption given to mortgage lenders from consumer laws, which would enable the Attorney General's office to press actions in cases of unfair or deceptive lending practices. The bill would be a step toward curbing predatory lending. CNDC will be engaged in advocacy efforts coordinated by COHHIO to support this bill and a similar but broader reaching bill, S.B. 162, introduced by State Senator Tom Roberts. News reports have the banking industry already pitted against these bills. In the meantime, Governor Taft announced in late October a proposal to allocate \$1.5 million to hire 14 more staff in the Commerce Department, which monitors and investigates mortgage brokers. This was in part a response to a series of articles published in *The Dispatch*, Columbus' daily newspaper, entitled "Brokered Dreams" that chronicled foreclosures, flipping, and predatory lending in that city.

**Ohio Vacant Properties Forum** was attended by close to 300 individuals representing all parts of the state, and many local and state government agencies and nonprofit organizations. Look next month in this column for more news on the event and its outcomes.

**"Steelyard Secrets,"** a report issued by Policy Matters Ohio, examines the role of the Port Authority and federal tax credits in the financing of Steelyard Commons, a major retail project that has stirred controversy over its "big box" tenants, particularly Wal-Mart. The report recommends that the "full details of the Port Authority's involvement with NEODF (Northeast Ohio Development Fund) in general and the Steelyard Commons project in particular should be made public." **Federal Reserve analysis of new Home Loan Mortgage Disclosure (HMDA) data shows lending disparities.** According to an article entitled "New Information Reported under HMDA and Its Application in Fair Lending Enforcement," (Federal Reserve Bulletin, Summer 2005), 2004 HMDA data show that "the differences between minorities and non-Hispanic whites in the incidence of higher priced lending are generally more than 20 percentage points for various loan products." Higher priced lending refers to the sub prime and near prime markets. For conventional home loans, the mean unadjusted incidence of higher-priced lending was 32.4 percent for blacks and 8.7 percent for non-Hispanic whites.

The article cautions that much of this difference can be explained by borrower characteristics. However, its analysis at the level of lending institutions showed that about 2 percent of the 8,853 lenders covered by HMDA showed a statistically significant difference in the incidence of higher-priced loans between black and Hispanic borrowers, and between black and non-Hispanic white borrowers. Since this article was published, it has been reported that many of these lending institutions are under review by federal regulators to evaluate the fairness or bias of their practices in making mortgage loans.

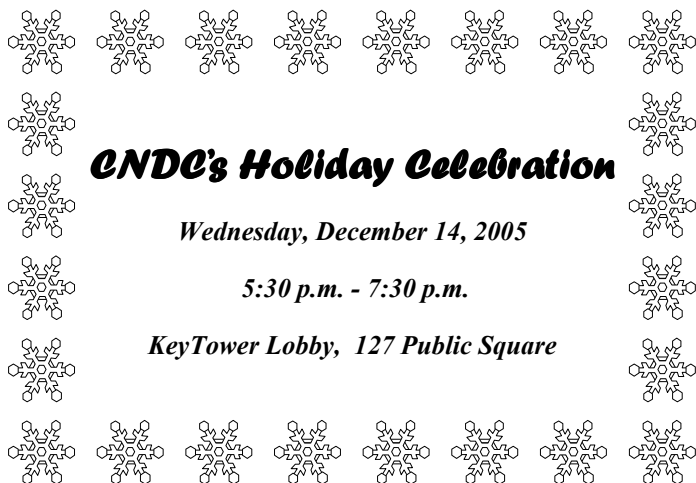

## COMMITTEE CORNER

**Community Organizers' Committee:** The committee heard from Jaclyn Stacy from Jobs for Justice who talked about anti-Wal-Mart organizing efforts in Cleveland and Cuyahoga County. Sheryl Serreda then discussed the community outreach efforts being conducted by The Cleveland Botanical Garden. A discussion ensued regarding the Cleveland Leadership Summit. It was agreed that a follow-up meeting to de-brief regarding the Summit would be held on October 20th at 1:00 p.m. at the CNDC offices. Announcements included upcoming Appreciative Inquiry Training, Mayoral candidate forums on October 13th, 20th, and 25th, and the Community Organizer Basic Training on Oct. 6th, 7th, 12th, 14th and 17th at Lakefront State Park.

**Housing Committee:** At the September meeting, Phil Star of CSU's Center for Neighborhood Development announced and described a new on-line rental service for both landlords and persons looking for affordable rental housing, [www.housingcleveland.org](http://www.housingcleveland.org). The committee evaluated its subcommittee structure and meeting schedule and agreed that: the committee as a whole should continue to meet every other month, with subcommittees meeting during "off" months; subcommittees will meet the same day and consecutively. Subcommittees were charged with identifying top priorities in October and to begin a work plan for the next year.

**Retail Commercial Support Initiative:** The agenda for the September meeting consisted of a presentation by Jeff Holody of the County Department of Development. He discussed the County's Community Assessment Initiative, a new program designed to jumpstart brownfield redevelopment projects. An important aspect of the County's program is that it can be used for the typically smaller properties found in the neighborhoods. The other item addressed at the meeting was the review of the committee workplan crafted by the governance subcommittee.
